Last and this week we are celebrating our Catholicity in many different ways. We celebrated with a feast for Shrove Tuesday to mark the beginning of Ash Wednesday and Lent. Lent and Holy Week are integral to our faith. Over the remainder of this term I will exploring Lent in four key parts; Prayer, Fasting, Almsgiving and the Symbols of Lent. These are resources I located from Understanding Faith. They are easy to read and share with your family after dinner or before bed.

Part One: Adjusting our Lives!

During the Ash Wednesday Mass in 2014 Pope Francis explained that Lent is a time to adjust your life, to get closer to the Lord. He explained prayer,

fasting and almsgiving.

Prayer is the strength of the Christian and of every believing person.

Fasting helps us to grow in the spirit of the Good Samaritan, who bends down to his brother in need and takes care of him.

Almsgiving is when things are given to someone without expecting anything in

return.

Prayer

Prayer was very important to Jesus. He prayed to God the Father privately many times. He also prayed with his apostles. Jesus prayed in the garden of Gethsemane on the night before he died.



When we reflect on the cartoon titled, 'Talking to God'. The man in the cartoon thought he was talking to God. He was disappointed because he didn't think God answered him. The man forgot that prayer is more than talking to God. It also involves listening to God. If the man had listened to God he would have learnt that God answered every one of his prayers.

Lent is a special time for talking to God but it is also a special time for listening to God. When we talk to God He speaks to us in our hearts. All we have to do is listen to our hearts.

When we pray to God during Lent we make a special effort to accept that we are not perfect. We tell Jesus that we have been selfish and unkind at times. We tell him that we are sorry and that we want to do better. And we learn from Jesus what we have to do by listening to what he has to tell us. Jesus is pleased when our prayer is sincere and when we listen to God. He said to his friends: When you pray, do not use a lot of meaningless words, as the pagans do, who think that their gods will hear them because their prayers are long.

Morning Drop Off



Children dropped off prior to 8:30am (time at which school grounds are supervised), must be seated outside the gates waiting for school to open. Please ensure your children are aware of this requirement.

It has come to our attention that the procedures around dropping of and collecting of children from the 'Kiss and Drive' zone are not being adhered to and are causing some concern in relation to the safety and convenience of our children and families as well as the residents of Higgins Street.

Firstly, please DO NOT block or park across resident's driveways.

Essentially, the 'Kiss and Drive' zone allows for only a two minute period where a vehicle can be stationary and children may be dropped off or picked up (according to school procedure). The driver MUST NOT leave the vehicle. Some people have been parking in the zone for much greater length of time and getting out of their vehicles to walk children to the entrance gates in the morning. This is inconvenient for other drivers.

We are very fortunate to have a well developed 'Kiss and Drive' zone that operates smoothly when all concerned follow correct procedure.

Afternoon Pick Up

We have received a visit from LAC Traffic Police Officer expressing their concern of parents continually double parking in the afternoon. We have been warned that fines will be issued if this continues.

End of day school bell is 3:10pm. So, please do not start to line up in your cars before this time. Some parents and carers are there as early as 2:50pm which is not necessary.

> We advise you to not arrive at school till after 3:10 to collect your child. Or alternately park and walk to collect your child from school. Teachers are on duty with the children until 3:30pm.

> Could you please pass this information onto all family members and carers that may collect your child from school.

Mangahigh Maths Ninja Challenge

From 6 to 17 March, Students in Years 1 to 6 will be participating in the Maths Ninja Challenge on www.mangahigh.com. Mangahigh is a games-based maths program which has activities linked to the curriculum. Every child has received their login and password from their teacher this week.

Students earn points by completing an activity and earning either a Bronze (1 point), Silver (2 points) or Gold (3 points) level in that activity. At the end of the challenge, students who have earned more than 100 points will receive a real medallion based on their achievement:

Quality Catholic Schooling

All Catholic schools in the Diocese of Parramatta will be participating in the Quality Catholic Schooling (QCS) project in 2017

QCS will provide data from students, staff and parents about our school's cultural behaviour, relationships and I earning community and will assist us to focus our efforts for improvement by building on our successes to date.

From 13 -24 March all staff, approximately 45 students from Stage 3, and 60 randomly-selected parents will be asked to complete an online survey. Staff and students will complete the survey online at school. Parents will be sent home a paper survey but will also be able to complete the survey online if preferred. The survey will take about 20-30 minutes to complete.

A survey consultant (Insight SRC) has been engaged to manage the data collection. The survey data will be kept strictly confidential and no individual will be identified to the school or the Catholic Education Office. Each school will receive an information report at the end of May and will use this report to inform their planning.

Achievements




Liam Wamsley competed at the Parramatta Diocesan Swimming Carnival last week.

Infectious Diseases in Schools

Children are at increased risk of some infectious diseases because they have not yet developed immunity to them, they tend to gather in groups, and they may have difficulty with some aspects of hygiene. The link below takes you to a great FACT SHEET on a range of Childhood Infectious diseases.

Here are a few examples:

Chicken Pox Time from exposure to illness 10 to 21 days, usually 14 to 16 days.

Symptoms Slight fever, runny nose, and a rash that begins as raised pink spots that blister and scab. **Do I need to keep my child home?** Yes, for 5 days from the onset of the rash and the blisters have dried. **How can I help prevent spread?** Immunise your child at 18 months of age. Immunisation is recommended for children at 12 years if they are not immune.

Head Lice Time from infestation to eggs hatching Usually 7 to 10 days. **Symptoms** Itchy scalp, white specks stuck near the base of the hairs; lice may be found on the scalp.

Do I need to keep my child home? No, as long as head lice management is ongoing.

How can I prevent spread? Family, friends and classroom contacts should be examined and treated if infested. Clothing and bedding should be washed in hot water.

Influenza Time from exposure to illness 1 to 3 days.

Symptoms Sudden onset fever, runny nose, sore throat, cough, muscle aches and headaches.

Do I need to keep my child home? Yes, until they look and feel better.

How can I prevent spread? Careful hand washing, especially after coughing, sneezing or wiping your nose. Immunisation is recommended for children with chronic illnesses.

National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) 2017 LETTER TO PARENTS

In May 2017 the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) will be completed by students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. NAPLAN has the support of all State and Territory Education Ministers and will assess the literacy and numeracy skills of students across Australian schools.

The results of the tests will provide important information to schools about what each student can do, and will be used to support teaching and learning programs. Parents will receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement. Each student's level of achievement will be reported against the national minimum standard.

Student background information (student name, gender, date of birth, language background and Aboriginality) will be collected as part of the National Assessment Program. This information is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that every student's right to privacy is maintained.

The NAPLAN tests will be conducted from 9-11 May 2017.

In the numeracy tests students do not require any measuring tools such as rulers or protractors. In Years 7 and 9 there will be one numeracy test with two parts: Part A calculator is allowed and Part B where calculators are not to be used. For the calculator test, the student should use the calculator that they currently use at school.

Friday 12 May – A 'catch-up' day is scheduled for students who missed a test or were absent on a test day. Students may be considered for exemption from the tests if they:

- are newly arrived in Australia (less than one year before the test) and with a language background other than English, or
- have significant intellectual disability and/or significant co-existing conditions which severely limit their capacity to participate in the tests.

All other students are expected to participate in the tests. Disability adjustments which reflect the student's normal level of support in the classroom may be provided. Large print, braille, coloured paper versions and electronic tests are available to meet the needs of individual students.

Access to disability adjustments or exemption from the tests must be discussed with the school principal and a parent or carer consent form must be signed.

Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by their parent or carer. This is a matter for consideration by parents in consultation with the school principal. If you wish to withdraw your child from the tests, a parent or carer consent form must be signed.

Please make an appointment with the principal of the school your child attends if you would like to discuss your child's participation in NAPLAN.
