Staff Development Days SEE NOTE UNDER GENERAL NEWS Dear St Nicholas of Myra Families,

What a great first week back - school photos and Grandparent's Day tomorrow!

Italians have a cherished proverb that says, "If nothing is going well, call your grandmother." The following story might give an insight as to why this proverb is cherished. An educational psychologist was on her way from Perth to Adelaide to conduct a series of seminars and workshops for parents who were experiencing difficulties with their children. Sitting next to her on the flight was an eighty-year-old woman who was prone to short outbursts of conversation. During one such occasion she declared, "I've had a wonderful life. I have six children, thirteen grandchildren and eighteen great grandchildren." As she was completing her statement, she cast an eye over the papers and notes in front of the psychologist and said, "That all looks very important. What do you do?"

The psychologist thought, "Oh no! If I tell her what I do, I'll be saddled with three generations of problems for the remainder of the flight!" However, she decided to tell the old lady what she did and what she was about to do. As the old lady settled back into her seat, her response was, "Now, isn't that interesting. If you want to know anything, just ask."

Grandparents have the experience and knowledge that come from surviving a great many years of life's battles and hopefully, they have the wisdom to know when to share this experience and knowledge with their grandchildren. Jimmy Carter once observed that, "Because grandparents are free to love, guide and befriend young people without having to take daily responsibility for them, they can often reach out beyond pride and fear of failure and close the gap between generations."

Besides being the keepers of family traditions and history, grandparents provide grandchildren with examples of hard work and family loyalty. Grandparents' stories contribute to family identity by sharing knowledge about relatives, important events, family traditions, the grandparent's childhood and the childhood of the grandchild's parent. As these stories are passed on, the grandchild can gain a positive image of their place within the family and a positive image of ageing.

When we become parents, we automatically give our parents a new position in life, that of being grandparents. At the same time, we give our child the added security of belonging to an extended family. The relationship between grandchild and grandparent can be very life-enhancing: a grandchild can bring love, energy, optimism, laughter, youthfulness and sometimes purpose to the life of their grandparent. At the same time, a grandparent can provide maturity, knowledge, stability, a wise ear and unconditional love to a grandchild.

Nowadays, being a grandparent might not be as simple as you would like due to divorce, remarriage or geographic distance. However, whether you are a grandparent, step-grandparent or even a grandparent raising a grandchild, you are THE most important person in your grandchild's life and, as you well know, it's not only Italians who ring their grandmother when things aren't going so well. I love this day with our families. Unfortunately, all of my grandparents have passed. I use this day to remember the times I had with them and give thanks for time and gift of family.

"God, Father of us all, we are thankful for our life and for the privilege to be parents and grandparents. We pray for patience, guidance and wisdom to use our life's role, for our own benefit and the benefit and enjoyment of our extended family. Amen."

St Vinnies Return and Earn

The NSW State Government launched the Return and Earn Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) in late 2017 in an effort to address drink container litter, which makes up 44% of the volume of all litter in the state. Vinnies participation in the scheme expands on its ethos and ongoing commitment to recycling, and is an extension of their retail store philosophy of reuse – helping to divert waste from landfill and supporting those in need at the same time.

The program provides Vinnies with an additional revenue stream to help fund its Good Works within communities across NSW, receiving a handling fee for every container processed. As part of our ongoing commitment to social justice and sustainability we will be supporting the return and earn scheme through Vinnies. Two bins will be established in our school for the collection of containers. Containers can be brought in from home as one bin will be placed near the school gates. The other bin will be on the playground for staff and students to place appropriate containers. All proceeds will be going directly to Vinnies.


Religion



Prewriting - where the students use drawings and letters to represent words to convey a story.






Stage 1 Writing across a page to convey different parts of a sequence story.






Goal: For all students to know and transfer their multiplicative thinking and reasoning skills to solve problems efficiently.





They all perform regularly in a variety of ensembles and styles throughout Australia and internationally. This performance is a key element of the Music program that students will be taking part in during Creative Arts lessons this term. We look forward to welcoming Zeeko to our school!

Project Based Learning

Each year we are fortunate to have a critical friend process in relation to our learning and teaching of Project Based Learning. We were able to gain feedback for Stage 2 and 3 learning. This year it was Michael McDowell, Ed.D. is a national presenter, speaking on instruction, learning, leadership and innovation. He has provided professional development services to large school districts, State Departments of Education, and higher education. In addition, he was a former National Faculty member for the Buck Institute of Education and a key thought leader in the inception of their leadership work in scaling innovation in instructional methodologies. His expertise in design and implementation is complimented by his scholarly approach to leadership, learning, and instruction.

He holds a B.S. in Environmental Science and a M.A. in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Redlands and an Ed.D. from the University of La Verne. He received departmental honors for his work in Environmental Science and was awarded the Tom Fine Creative Leadership Award for his doctoral work at the University of La Verne. He has also completed certification programs through Harvard University, the California Association of School Business Officials, the American Association of School Personnel Administrators, and Cognition Education. He holds both a California single subject teaching credential and an administrative credential. Dr. McDowell currently serves as the Superintendent of the Ross School District. Most recently, he served as the Associate Superintendent of Instructional and Personnel Services at the Tamalpais Union High School District. During his tenure, the Tamalpais Union High School District was recognized by the Marzano Research Laboratories as one of the top highly reliable organizations in the United States, and schools within the district received recognitions by the US News and World Report, and honored with California Distinguished Schools accolades.

Prior to his role as a central office administrator, Dr.McDowell served as the Principal of North Tahoe High School, a California Distinguished School. Prior to administration, Dr.McDowell was a leadership and instructional coach for the New Tech Network supporting educators in designing, implementing, and enhancing innovative schools across the country. Before engaging in the non profit sector, Dr.McDowell created and implemented an environmental science and biology program at Napa New Technology High School, infusing 1:1 technology, innovative teaching and assessment, and leveraging student voice in the classroom. Additionally, Dr.McDowell, taught middle school math and science in Pacifica, CA.

Project- and Problem-Based Learning is a very popular method of instruction, but PBL is often not designed thoughtfully to address surface, deep, and transfer learning outcomes. McDowell describes three key shifts that need to happen in PBL design to reach students' learning goals, which are clarity, challenge and culture. When these shifts are implemented in PBL design, the result is learners who are both confident and competent. Confident learners have a growth mindset, are assessment capable, and collaborate. Competent learners have the right surface and deep knowledge, and can transfer it to new situations.

Michael Dowell gave overwhelming positive feedback to our staff and more importantly our students for their

- Understanding of the learning process in PBL; PBL calendar, rubric, question,
- The clarity and purpose of the student's learning
- Joint construction of the Success Criteria
- Conversations with the students demonstrated that they
 - knew their groups and what was expected to be a prepared learner
 - could name the learning
 - could make connections to our emergency drills
 - referred to their research in English
 - use visual, words to create a picture of their thinking
- Peer (student to student) feedback named before their plan
- Workshops provided by the teachers were at their point of need
- Different forms of sources images, text, videos for research and analysis using skimming and scanning skills
- Connections between different sources of energy; how they are the same and yet different

Project Based Learning (cont.)

Our next step in our learning is how do we create more opportunities for students to transfer their learning. This is where the students make their connections between concepts, skills and ideas.
