FRIDAY 6 SEPT STAFF DEVELOPMENT DAY Dear St Nicholas of Myra Families,

Most Christians would recognise the names of Lourdes and Fatima and associate these places with appearances by Mary. Few Christians would know that in the twentieth century there were 386 reported appearances by Mary. The apparitions have been spread across the globe: Fatima, Portugal; Banneux, Belgium; Akita, Japan; Syracuse, Italy; Zeitoun, Egypt; Betania, Venezuela; Manila, Philippines. Mary's reported appearances have been to men, women and children in large cities, remote areas, caves, churches, fields, homes and other places. The above mentioned appearances have been approved by the Church as having "supernatural status"; most of the remaining appearances have been denied this status.

Term 3 Week 5

The history of Marian apparitions stretches from the beginnings of the Church and every country in the world has its own shrines or chapels or churches, which give emphasis to the influence of Mary on the lives of the local people. Many Christians regard Mary as the female gateway through which they experience the divine. One of Britain's most popular shrines is of Our Lady of Walsingham which is more than one thousand years old and still attracts hundred's of thousands of pilgrims each year. Recently, the B.B.C. questioned some of the pilgrims as to why they had come:

"I see the Blessed Virgin not only as Mother of God, but as a leader because she was a strong woman, she was a faithful believer, she lost her own son and for me she is a model of a very strong person and for this I admire her."

"I am a mother, therefore, I can identify with her. For me, Mary is the feeling, compassionate mother; the all-embracing mother. I have the experience of having children; in that way I connect with Mary."

It would seem that Mary is a sign of hope and comfort to all Christians who, as God's pilgrim people, make our journey through life. Mary offers us a calm vision as we are tested by our own personal limitations, the circumstances that life presents to each of us and the sense of uncertainty with which our own mortality challenges us. Mary, through her life, shows us how hope can overcome anguish, inner peace can overcome anxiety and a life lived in a positive manner can overcome the fear of death.

The Assumption of Mary recognises the unique position of her being a superlative human person, who was taken body and soul to heaven. In some way, Mary's Assumption makes her a "hero" figure for us, her fellow human beings, because she was a participant in her Son's Resurrection and an anticipation of the resurrection of other Christ followers.

The first time Jesus and Mary are mentioned together as adults, is at the Marriage Feast of Cana. When the hosts risked the embarrassment of a shortage of wine, Mary approached the "Hospitality workers" and said to them of her Son, "Do as He tells you." This advice was timeless for it can be applied to all Christians in every day and age: love God, love your neighbour, love yourself; be people of compassion and forgiveness. Of course, this requires us to be in imitation of Mary when, at the Annunciation, her "yes" was the beginning of allowing God into her life. If we join with Mary's "yes", we give ourselves the opportunity, as she did, to be perfected through our union with Christ.

Mary, we ask you to help us to find peace within ourselves through your Son, Jesus. Through your intercession, may we be inspired to greater trust and hope in our ability to live our lives, as you did yours, and to bring Christ to the world. Amen.



At St Nicholas, one of our three expectations is "I am Safe". This expectation transfers between school and home. Students live in an age where the technology is available in many different forms. We must work with the students to keep them safe on the internet, just as we would around roads and swimming pools. They need explicit modelling and open communication with parents and carers about their internet and gaming habits.


The office of the e safety commission, https://www.esafety.gov.au/parents/online-safety-guide offers some practical advice for parents and carers as well as some tips for managing your child's online habits.

Websites and Apps

Some websites seem harmless, but can contain some content not appropriate for children. Common video platforms such as YouTube, Vimeo and DailyMotion contain content for all ages and allow anyone to access this content while social media platforms such as facebook, instagram, Google +, snapchat and Whatsapp allow students to chat and send images. These apps and websites have clear age restrictions due to their content and easy access to comment and sent messages and images.

Some practical tips to ensure students are accessing safe materials include:

- have a shared agreement for technology use including what can be accessed and time to be used
- having technology in common areas only
- not using headphones to watch videos
- technology facing outwards so it can be seen
- research child friendly alternatives such as YouTube Kids
- ensuring technology is locked away after a certain time
- discuss your child's internet use








Student Reviews - The Lion King
