Dear St Nicholas of Myra Families,

On Sunday 8 August we celebrated St Mary of the Cross MacKillop. Her life as a spiritual guide and model to many Australians and more specifically to us as teachers. Who so often feel the calling to the vocation for education to give love, faith and service to our young children.

The early local Church didn't know Mary MacKillop as a person who would one day be recognised as a saint. It chose Mary Help of Christians as its first patron. The main reason for this was that during the early days of settlement the Mass was not widely celebrated in Australia. Rather it was the Rosary that kept the faith alive during this time. This changed in 2010 when St Mary MacKillop was officially recognised as Australia's first saint by the Universal Church.

So what makes St Mary of the Cross special for Aussies?

One possible answer is that she mirrors back to us something about ourselves, our character as a people living in this remote and ancient Great South Land of the Holy Spirit.

Like all who have come to settle in Australia, Mary was a daughter of immigrant parents. The year that Mary was born, her father, Alexander MacKillop became bankrupt and had difficulty in providing for the family due to his sometimes erratic and argumentative personality and his propensity to want to help others - often at the expense of his own family. So at the age of fourteen, Mary had to go out to work to help support her family. *Mary's life was chequered with many amazing graces but also with difficulty, disappointment, illness and tragedy. Her love of God and neighbour was formed out of empathy through adversity.*

So what makes St Mary's story one we can look to and learn from today?

Mary's greatest legacy is that she started Catholic schools for the poor and marginalised through her Sisters of St Joseph (The Brown Joeys). The first school was in a stable in the small town of Penola in South Australia. *She saw a need and she did something about it!*

Mary never held a grudge. Even when she was excommunicated from the Church she loved, she treated those who persecuted her with mercy. Her belief that God was a good God and that He worked for the care of all in His own time, was her guiding principle.

Here is a prayer you can pray as a family.

Mary MacKillop Prayer

Loving and eternal Father,
You are glorified in your Saints.
To you all praise and glory and honour!

You inspired Mary of the Cross to live by faith in your Son, Jesus Christ, and to share in the saving power of His cross.

As we travel on our way to join Mary MacKillop in our true home with you, we are asking her to pray with us this special favour.....

Lord Hear our prayer.

We pray that you send your Holy Spirit into our hearts to give us faith like her faith.

Help us to bear the cross as she did and to follow the example of her kindness.
We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

What can we learn from St Mary MacKillop?

She believed everyone deserves respect, love, dignity and forgiveness. In a world that is often reactionary, her strong, quiet and constant message of Christian Love and her unstinting belief in the goodness of God (God's Providence) can seem to our cynical modern hearts to be naively idealistic. This example of her faith provides inspiration and hope for us all - particularly in these most challenging of times.

Gospel Lk 1:39-56


Mary set out and went as quickly as she could to a town in the hill country of Judah. She went into Zechariah's house and greeted Elizabeth. Now as soon as Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit. She gave a loud cry and said, 'Of all women you are the most blessed, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. Why should I be honoured with a visit from the mother of my Lord? For the moment your greeting reached my ears, the child in my womb leapt for joy. Yes, blessed is she who believed that the promise made her by the Lord would be fulfilled.'

And Mary said:

'My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord and my spirit exults in God my saviour; because he has looked upon his lowly handmaid. Yes, from this day forward all generations will call me blessed, for the Almighty has done great things for me. Holy is his name, and his mercy reaches from age to age for those who fear him. He has shown the power of his arm, he has routed the proud of heart. He has pulled down princes from their thrones and exalted the lowly. The hungry he has filled with good things, the rich sent empty away. He has come to the help of Israel his servant, mindful of his mercy – according to the promise he made to our ancestors – of his mercy to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.'

Mary stayed with Elizabeth about three months and then went back home.

Remote Learning


Remote Learning Events

Infants Literacy Challenge: 'Sassy Snaps'



2022 Kindergarten Enrolment Process has commenced and places are being accepted by families. Current St Nicholas of Myra families who have a child commencing school in 2022 are encouraged to complete an enrolment form as soon as possible to avoid disappointment.

The process:

1. Enrolment forms can be found online at: <https://ceo-web.parra.catholic.edu.au/enrolment/02-Form-A-Enrolment-Application.pdf> or in the school office.
2. Please submit your paperwork via email or post. Due to COVID this is a preferred method of submission.
3. The School Enrolment Officer will contact you. We usually make an interview time with one or both parents and the enrolling child attends, however due to COVID-19 we will be unable to conduct these interviews.
4. The Principal will review your application.
5. Once the review process has determined an outcome a letter will be sent to you.



ICAS Assessment

ICAS Assessments were due to take place over the next few weeks. Due to the extension of lockdown and remote learning, these have been postponed until October (early Term 4). New dates will be communicated to the families who have registered and paid for these assessments when we return to face to face teaching.

The deadline to purchase ICAS assessments for your child has also been extended until Sunday 19 September 2021. These need to be purchased through the online Parent Payment System to make a direct payment to UNSW Global. The Parent Payment System is a simple and secure online payment service specifically for parents to purchase ICAS Assessments.

Entries and Payments can not be accepted at school.
